President's Message len Cole

Change is the Only Constant

As I type these words, I am recently back from a wonderful weekend in Boston at the 2017 URJ Biennial Convention, where, alongside 6,000

or so other Reform Jews including a record number of BHSS lay-leaders, we had the opportunity to learn, pray, sing, share, discuss, network, and of course eat (we are Jews, after all!). It was a wonderful experience and I am still feeling invigorated and energized by the ruach (spirit) which was palpable from the moment I arrived. There were many meaningful moments and a lot of laughs too, including when one rabbi approached me to introduce herself to me and then expressed relief to discover I was a synagogue president and not clergy, leaving her title of "tallest North-American rabbi" unchallenged! The offerings for learning throughout the weekend were plentiful and diverse, making it difficult at times choose from the options. Most of the sessions I selected focused on transition and change. As author Anita Diamant described in her Shabbat luncheon session, it can seem as though, in our personal lives as well as in synagogue life, "Change is the only constant."

This sentiment feels especially true at BHSS, as we continue to navigate the rabbinic transition. As I hope you are by now aware, the BHSS Search Committee, with the staff's enthusiastic endorsement, announced its unanimous selection of Rabbi Ilana Schwartzman to become our community's next settled rabbi beginning July 1, 2018 (please see search update on page 24 for more details and a biography). On December 4, this recommendation was presented and approved at a special congregational meeting. Cantor Perper began the evening by offering words of blessing in a beautiful moment of thanksgiving, anticipation and excitement, and following the vote we celebrated by singing the *shehechianu*, collectively expressing gratitude to have reached this milestone in our congregation's history.

While we are overjoyed to have successfully completed our search process, naming Rabbi Ilana as our new Rabbi does not mark the end of our process. Rather, it is merely the beginning...of a new beginning. William Bridges, an preeminent expert whose pioneering research transformed what we understand about the human response to change and author of the book Managing Transitions: Making the Most of Change (Da Capo Press, 2009), made an important distinction between change and transition, the former referring to an external, situational shift; the latter being more about an internal, multi-dimensional human process of reorienting from one reality and adapting to a new one. A change can happen all at once, but a transition involves psychological and emotional period that requires sensitivity, awareness, intentionality and a plan to move through it.

Identifying Rabbi Ilana as our soon-to-be next spiritual leader is a change for certain, but there remains considerable work to be done by all of us to ensure that our community is wellprepared to welcome and embrace her family, and together in partnership with her write the next chapter of our kehilah kedosha, our holy community. Saying good-bye to our Interim Rabbi Barry Diamond, who has served us well and helped us to clarify who we are as a community and envision our future; Intentionally working to create opportunities and experiences so that Rabbi Ilana can be successful in creating new sacred partnerships with our clergy, staff, lay leaders and members at large; and acknowledging that this important shift will affect our members in different ways and on different timelines - are all part of the transition. I invite you to embrace this transition along with me, with all its complicated dimensions and emotions. As challenging as embracing transition can be, it is also a tremendous catalyst for growth and unleashing undiscovered potential. As we begin the new calendar year of 2018, let us go from strength to strength...

I also invite you to mark your calendars so you too can join in on the fun in 2019 at the next URJ Biennial in Chicago, December 11-15!

To (and from) Boston...and Beyond!

The URJ Biennial (which others have written about elsewhere in this

issue) is always a phenomenal opportunity in the life of a synagogue lay leader, member-at-large, teen, or staff member. This particular biennial took me back to the state I grew up in, so it was extra special to hear that old familiar "Bahstun" accent everywhere. From Wednesday through Sunday, there were learning sessions, worship services, musical presentations – in other words, tremendous opportunities to study old text and new ideas, pray with our voices (or in the case of the yoga service, our bodies), and sing time-honored favorites as well as new compositions that are sure to become favorites. You could, if you chose, be busy from 7:30 a.m. until midnight, every day.

And for every learning session time block there were at least 15 different offerings; for Saturday morning Torah study alone there were at least 10 teachers, and lunch on Saturday offered over 10 choices for topic and teacher. It was wonderful and mind-boggling at the same time! The exhibition hall hosted 8 aisles of vendors of travel, synagogue furnishings, Judaica, jewelry, *tallitot* and *kippot*, accountants, music, alternative education formats, books, and music. It also included a musical stage, which was always showcasing an artist. With the help of the official Biennial app, we could keep track of our favorite sessions, plan our schedules, and

keep in touch with others.

I had a chance to see, face to face, URJ facilitators I have been working with only via online sessions. With my husband Rod and my son Ari, who arrived on Friday, I enjoyed Shabbat dinner with the rest of the BHSS contingent (with our special guests imported from Cape Cod, my father and his friend.) There is nothing like sharing dinner with over 5,000 of your (new) closest friends, then praying and singing with them in the largest Shabbat service ever. If you stopped to listen, it was truly magical.

One of the sessions I attended was about transition and change. It taught me a lot about how people perceive and process change. While our brains understand that change can be very, very good (I am so very excited for the opportunity to plan and dream, together with our new settled rabbi, Ilana Schwartzman and Cantor Perper), our feelings are important too, and they can be conflicted. How can we know what the future will hold? How will it feel? Will this change really be good? There is no logic and no right answer.

I learned so much at this Biennial, but the biggest thing I brought home to BHSS is that our task is to do what we have always done as leaders and as a community. That is: to move forward, together. In the coming months, with each other's

help, I hope we can all come to see how many more opportunities – for caring, learning, praying, singing, and just being together - this next chapter in our story will bring.

Join us for a weekend of music and learning with Dr. Gilad Cohen. We will hold a series of events Friday, Saturday and Sunday that will offer a full range of musical experiences. Dr. Cohen's expertise ranges from Israeli, classical to classic rock music and everything in between. He will collaborate with Cantor Perper and Rabbi Diamond to teach us, move us and to open our minds to new experiences with Jewish music.

Friday, February 9 - 7:30 p.m. Erev Shabbat Services - Dr. Cohen will explore a text from liturgy, singing different musical settings of the text. He will lead a discussion on how those settings make us feel and think. Is the text joyous, introspective, or spiritual? Come listen and learn.



Saturday, February 10 - 7:00 p.m. The evening begins with Havdalah and continues with a wonderful multimedia presentation of *Israeli Songs - Then and Today*. The presentation features recorded music as well as live performances by Dr. Cohen and Cantor Perper. Keeping with the theme of the evening, Israeli food and drink will be served.

Sunday, February 11 - 10:15 a.m. – Dr. Cohen will join Cantor Perper and Rabbi Diamond for an interactive T'filah including a session about music and liturgy and how these important elements inform our lives.



Gilad Cohen is an active composer, performer and theorist in various genres including concert music, rock and music for theatre. Recent and upcoming engagements include commissions from Barlow Endowment for the Arts, Concert Artists Guild, Parlance Chamber Concerts and Park Avenue Synagogue; performances by Lysander Piano Trio, Israeli Chamber Project, Tre Voci (Kim Kashkashian, Marina Piccinini and Sivan Magen), violist Paul Neubauer, and principal players of the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra and the Budapest Festival Orchestra; and releases on Albany Records, Naxos/Delos and Parma Recordings. Notable awards include the 2016 Barlow Prize, the Israeli Prime Minister Award for Composers, and top prizes in international competitions in the US, Europe, Asia and the Middle-East. Gilad performs regularly with various ensembles around the US, playing piano, bass and guitar. An Assistant Professor of Music at Ramapo College of New Jersey, Gilad holds a Ph.D. in composition from Princeton University. His research about structure in the music of Pink Floyd has resulted in publications on academic journals, lectures in the US and Israel, and the first-ever academic conference devoted to the band that Gilad produced in 2014 at Princeton University together with composer Dave Molk. www.giladcohen.com




Hello everyone!

Eternal Lights Dinner 2017

The light keeps burning over the ark in the Jewish synagogue. It is the *Ner Tamid*, our Eternal Light which burns perpetually over the ark of our sacred Torah. The *Ner Tamid* is a symbolic reminder of the light that burns continuously in the western section of the ancient temple of Jerusalem. The Reform Judaism movement is alive and relevant according to Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President of the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ).

I am grateful that I had the opportunity to attend the 74th URJ Biennial in Boston, Massachusetts in December along with 19 members of BHSS and nearly 6,000 Reform Jews from the United States, Canada and a few other countries. We came together to worship, learn, sing, build community, and shape the future of the Reform Movement. It was an amazing and memorable experience.

There were learning sessions for lay leaders and professionals, inspiring worship and torah study and an incredible line up of musicians and groups. (My new favorite band is Nefesh Mountain, bluegrass with Jewish spirit and soul.)

We were inspired by speakers such as Reverend Dr. William Barber II, Senator Elizabeth Warren and Rabbi Rick Jacobs. Reverend Barber, URJ Social Justice Partner, introduced The National Call for Moral Revival. Senator Warren talked about swimming hard against the tide. Rabbi Jacobs talked about water, its power and its vitality. Rabbi Jacobs said "Water is life because it is alive (...) so is our moment." On Saturday

Rabbi Jacobs' D'var Torah offered his vision for the future of Reform Judaism here in the United States and Israel. Rabbi Jacobs urged us to stop using the label "diaspora" in describing ourselves and suggested using the term "World Jewry" instead.

From the Sifriyah

As many of you know, the library has embarked on a new project this year: Exploring the stories of Jews from Faraway Places. The journey, so far, has been exciting and highly educational. Our first stop, in our first program, will be Yemen where, as you know from our earlier publicity, we will host several Yemenite Jews, hear their stories, learn a lot, and even taste typical Yemenite food. As a stimulus and precursor to attending this program, we would love to share some important facts and some history about the Jews of Yemen:

- Muslims in Yemen believed that jewelry made by Jews had healing or other magical powers;
- Yemenite Jews made their own ritual objects, doing everything from mining materials to carving the finished product;
- Yemenite Jews designed their homes to give an impression

of poverty, partly because of Yemenite law and partly not to make neighbors jealous of their riches;

- Women wore modest clothing, mirroring their Muslim neighbors;
- In 1948, the Jewish population in Yemen was 50,000;
- In 1949, Operation Magic Carpet brought 45,000 Jews to Israel:
- Today the Jewish population in Yemen is very small, numbering less than 60.

Very soon, the library will announce a date for our program, exploring Jews in Faraway Places, the Jews of Yemen. Since this is a program not to be missed, please watch for details amd then mark the date in your calendars.

Beth Sholom is a vibrant, egalitarian, diverse Conservative congregation founded in 1918. They combine a love of Jewish tradition with innovative approaches to experiencing the richness of Jewish life.

Beth Sholom Synagogue, designed by Frank Lloyd Wright, was designated a National Historic Landmark in 2007. The congregation has been its caretaker since it was completed in 1959.

The Beth Sholom Synagogue Preservation Foundation was created to preserve the Beth Sholom Synagogue, a National Historic Landmark. Beth Sholom is the only synagogue designed by the great American architect Frank Lloyd Wright, and was recognized shortly after his death by the American Institute of Architects and the National Trust for Historic Preservation as one of his seventeen most important projects. The Foundation's mission is to preserve the Wright-designed building, furniture, and landscape setting to the highest standards possible and to tell the story of this great American synagogue to a wide variety of audiences.




