A light exists in spring Not present on the year At any other period. When March is scarcely here... - Emily Dickinson

(#notmygroundhog) spotted his shadow, so when this publication reaches your hands we will apparently still be solidly entrenched

in winter. I'm guessing for most families Groundhog Day is a non-event, but in our home there were plenty of tears when the announcement was made this year (and not all of them were mine!)

You may recall a story I shared at the High Holidays of our daughter Emily's questions about what happens to unanswered prayers, including her birthday wish that she would forever remain the "perfect" age of six. Yet not even a year later, Emily is eagerly anticipating turning seven, so much so that she was temporarily heartbroken upon hearing the news of the infamous weather-predicting rodent's sighting. She assumed it meant her spring birthday would be delayed six weeks. Fortunately, after parental hugs, brotherly encouragement and a quick calendar lesson about how May 4 will in fact arrive no later despite Phil's forecast, she was all smiles and off to make a list of friends to invite to her unicorn party.

I often stand in amazement and admiration of how easily she is able to shift and bend and roll with the tides. I am reminded that as we grow older, we tend to become less flexible and less accepting of the ebbs and flows in our lives. We get stuck longing for the good old days or impatiently yearning for better times ahead. The weather notwithstanding, we cling to some seasons and wish away others. We grow nostalgic for seasons past; anxiously anticipate seasons to come; and perhaps fail to be fully grounded in the present.

One of the ways our Judaism encourages us to be mindful of the present can be found in the *G'vurot*. Depending on the time of the year, the words we recite change so that we may pray for the weather conditions that are needed. In winter, we acknowledge God's ability to cause the wind to shift and rain to fall; in summer God's power to rain dew upon us. When I utter this blessing, it serves as a reminder to simply be, to accept where I am in the here and now, loosen my grip on the past and take a break from anticipating the future.

Of course there are moments when it makes perfect sense to intentionally ponder the past and plan for the future. At A Light Exists...

BHSS we are at one of those times. This year marks the tenth anniversary of the merger between Beth Haverim and Reform Temple of Suffern – Shir Shalom to create Beth Haverim Shir Shalom. There will be a gathering followed by a special Shabbat

service on Friday March 9 to celebrate this milestone and I hope you are planning to attend this memorable evening. I am excited and honored to be a part of the planning, although admittedly, when the merger occurred, it was a *non*-event for our family. We had only recently joined and were far removed from the many months of negotiations and planning that went into this tremendous undertaking, not to mention the myriad emotions that surely accompanied this transition. I imagine this was especially true for our Rockland County friends, who were leaving something treasured behind to arrive at a new, largely unknown destination. In our planning meetings I have so enjoyed hearing stories about what this time was like for those who most affected. If you were one of the folks who was connected personally to the merger, I invite you to come share your story.

That said, please know that if you were not intimately involved, the service on March 9 is also for you. It is not exclusively a service to remember the past, but one that will also celebrate the present. Ten years later, we are one strong community. More than half of our members joined after the merge, and so likely do not know who came from which of the legacy congregations. When they look around the sanctuary, they see only fellow BHSS'ers. As a single community, we have been in each other's lives to share joyous occasions as well as moments of profound sorrow. We have been there for each other through our personal transitions and seasons as well as our collective ones.

It is also a time to come together to look to our future, as we continue to move through our rabbinic transition, our hearts filled with gratitude to Rabbi Barry Diamond and, simultaneously, excitement to welcome Rabbi Ilana Schwartzman this summer and begin to write the next chapter of our synagogue's history.

May we seamlessly shift from praying "mashiv haruach umorid hagashem" to "morid hatal" this year and for many, many years to come. May we go from strength to strength...

### From Israel to Egypt to Israel

When I think about the Passover story, it goes something like this: the Jews were in Egypt, the Jews left Egypt, the Jews returned to Israel. But there is another important part of the story. Before we went down to Egypt, we lived happily in Israel. Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebecca, Jacob, Rachel and Leah all lived in the Promised Land. Each of our ancestors traveled to Egypt for a time, but always returned. We may think the Torah is a story about our life in Israel, but much of the Torah is the story of our traveling away from -- and then back to -- Israel.

Our congregation is preparing itself for another return. For over a year and a half, BHSS has either been in Egypt or slowly moving through the Sinai wilderness back to the Promised Land of a settled rabbi leading us into the future. As we learn in the Torah story, transitions are never easy. Its chapters are filled with the people complaining to Moses, Moses complaining about the people, other leaders complaining about Moses. In the Torah's pages, the people fail and learn from their mistakes as do various leaders as well. But throughout this time of transition, the Israelites experimented with new ways to worship God and organize their society. The time in the wilderness is both challenging and invigorating.

We, too, are moving through our congregation's wilderness and can see our Promised Land more clearly than ever. While we still have a number of months to go, I am grateful for what I am learning through our trek together and hope that you will feel the same. It is true that most of the Torah focuses on life in Egypt and the journey back to Israel, but the Torah is not the only book of our Bible. In the next section of the Bible called the Prophets, we see the glory and challenges of the Israelites, living in relationship with God. We see what they build together and how they change and grow over time. The fact is, the Israelites in the latter books of the Bible were quite different than our ancestors who crossed the Sinai Desert. Because the truth is, we are always crossing through the wilderness. We are always changing and becoming, adapting to our new circumstances and discovering insights about God and ourselves.

As we prepare for this season of Exodus, let's celebrate the Israel of our past, learn from the Sinai transition in which we

## From the Educator's Office

Almost every week, I have the privilege of facilitating the very first rehearsal for our b'nei mitzvah

students and their families. They are all different and every time, I discover something new as I listen to each child's d'var Torah (speech).It is amazing how much they truly have learned and will teach about on a Saturday morning approximately four weeks later.

On a recent Wednesday, both students at the rehearsal are "twinning" with Holocaust victims, children who never got a change to become Jewish adults, never mind celebrate this life cycle event with their families and friends. As a part of their service, our students will tell us something about the children they are honoring.


And so, for this rehearsal, I brought out one of our two "Holocaust Torahs," so named because they are survivors; they each bear brass plates with a number that designates them as having been collected by the Nazis for still-unknown reasons, and then preserved by an organization in London, the Memorial Scrolls Trust. We are extremely fortunate to have two such scrolls in our Aron Kodesh (holy ark).

# ...you shall make them known to your children...

Each of the scrolls has its own personality – one is very tall, large in circumference, and heavy (probably a function of the type of wood that the *eitzim* (the posts on which they are rolled) are made of and the quality of the parchment, and the other is tall and slim. Both of them show their age in wrinkles and faded ink. They are truly like people, and as the years go by, they will soon be our only Holocaust survivors. Some scholars say that when we are looking to have a minyan (ten people) for a service, the Torah scrolls can be counted. I think this is especially true for our Holocaust scrolls.

Because of their age, they are a little more difficult to read from than our newest scroll (only 40+ years old). They do not have the chance to "get out" as much. But, like people, the more they are used they will not just become worn – they will become more well-loved, appreciated, and help us remember. Our congregation will commemorate Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day on Wednesday evening, April 11. Let's make an attempt to honor our scrolls a little more often than once a year. Please get in touch if you would like to explore the unique experience of having your child chant from one of them for their bar or bat mitzvah.



Julius Lester...Author of over 40 books, College Professor at the University of Massachusetts, Civil Rights Leader, African American, Convert to Judaism, died at age 78.

There were early signs that Lester would be drawn to Judaism. As a young child, he played over and over on the piano a simplified arrangement of Kol Nidre and

felt haunted by the melody. He had no idea where the melody came from or what it meant but loved it. Years later, he attended synagogue one Saturday morning as a guest, listening to the cantor singing the various melodies of the Shabbat morning service and he found himself almost in tears because he wanted to pray in song as the cantor was doing. He could not because he was not Jewish.

Much study and thought led to his and his wife's conversion in 1982. They prepared in a class of two. Often, Julius Lester devoured 20 books a week and came prepared to discuss these with the rabbi. Lester died on January 18, 2018. He leaves a rich, if sometimes controversial legacy. His memoir, chronicling his journey to Judaism, is *Lovesong: Becoming a Jew*. The memoir is in our library. It is definitely worth a read.



## **Ritual Committee**

#### The Counting of the Books

One cold Sunday this past February, several members of the Ritual Committee met in the sanctuary of our synagogue to count. We were assigned the task of taking inventory of our prayer books. Put another way, it was "the counting of the books." We were counting because of a generous donation and the possibility of replacing some of our prayer books. The Ritual Committee accepted the task to identify books that were usable and books that would need to be retired and replaced.

Twelve years ago, BHSS Sisterhood donated three hundred of the first printing run of the then-brand new *Mishkan T'filah* prayer books. They quickly found a home in our sanctuary. But that was twelve years ago and the once vibrant and crisp *siddurim* are worn and tired. Many are ripped and broken. On that cold February day, Ritual counted 208 prayer books; 165 in need of repair and 29 to be retired.

It's hard to say goodbye to old friends when they have been part of our lives for so many years. Our *siddurim* have been part of important celebrations and hardships from baby namings, b'nai mitzvahs, Shabbat services, and holiday festivals to funerals. Our tired and worn *siddurim* have been held by old members, new members and guests, children, students, teachers, parents, grandparents, lay leaders and clergy.

Many of our books will find a new home. The twenty-nine retired books will be donated to the Promenade Senior Living. Forty books will be donated to another temple that desperately needs prayer books. Some prayer books will be replaced. Some prayer books will be repaired.

Please consider donating to the prayer book fund by dedicating a siddur in honor or in memory of a loved one. Information can be found in *Temple Topics* or call the office.

#### Four Mitzvot of Purim

There are four basic mitzvot established by the Mishnah, the first Rabbinic law code, based on the text of the Book of Esther. Following the salvation of the Jews, Mordecai decreed the everlasting observance of the holiday, and Esther confirmed his ordinance:

#### Esther 9:29-31

<sup>9:29</sup> Then Queen Esther daughter of Abihail wrote a second letter of Purim for the purpose of confirming with full authority the aforementioned one of Mordecai the Jew. <sup>30</sup> Dispatches were sent to all the Jews in the hundred and twenty-seven provinces of the realm of Ahashuerus with an ordinance of "equity and honesty." <sup>31</sup> These days of Purim shall be observed at their proper time, as Mordecai the Jew—and now Queen Esther—has obligated them to do, and just as they have assumed for themselves and their descendants the obligation of the fasts with their lamentations. [I.e., the Jews are to celebrate this festive holiday in addition to their commemorations of national tragedies.]

#### 1. Reading the Megillah (Mikra Megillah)

And Esther's ordinance validating these observances of Purim was recorded in a scroll (Esther 9:32).

Each year, we retell the story of Purim, found in the Megillah (which is the same as the biblical book of Esther). As this story is one of overturned fortunes and unexpected endings, our recitation of the story is often humorous, honoring the festivity of the holiday.



#### 2. Festive meal (Se'udat Purim)

They were to observe [these days of Purim] as days of feasting and merrymaking... (9:22).

Purim is a time for feasting and making a day of gladness. Purim is a time for special foods such as *hamantashen* (cookies filled with poppy seeds or jam) and *kreplach* (dumplings).

#### 3. Sending gifts to friends (Mishloach Manot)



...for sending gifts to one another... (9:22)

On Purim, Jews across the kingdom of Persia celebrated their freedom, and they continue to share in that joy every year. Sending gifts to friends, often baskets c food and treats, is a practice intended to increase everyone's joy, both the sender and the receiver.

#### 4. Sending presents to the poor (*Matanot L'evyonim*)

...and [sending] presents to the poor (9:22).

The festivities of Purim are not reserved only for those who can afford them. Giving money or other gifts to those who are in need allows the spirit of the holiday to spread to every corner of the community.

#### Passover begins this year with the first seder on March 30

Many families will also celebrate a second seder on **March 31**Join your friends at BHSS for a congregational second seder!

## **Brotherhood 2.0**

Brotherhood did something different this year. Our annual coat drive was for donations to People to People of West Nyack, NY. The main reason we chose P2P this year is because they take all clothing, and they collect seasonal clothes all year long...so we're keeping the boxes out. They have a "dress for success program", so some of the clothing that gets donated helps young people dress for job interviews and get a leg up. Also P2P has a large food pantry that feeds hundreds of people each month...and all local.

Another thing that was different about this clothing drive is the amount of donations. Usually our coat drives result in a donation of about 90 coats per year. This year, we had two boxes and we lost count! Each time we came to the synagogue, the boxes were overflowing with coats and clothing...not to mention the additional pre-donations of spring clothing that Roberto bagged for us in the back room. We are writing in this edition of *Temple Topics* to thank you all for your donations and generosity, and continued support...but also to talk about clothing donations, food donations, soup kitchens, and all we do as a community to feed and clothe people. <u>Local</u> donations help <u>local</u> people.

These are people who live next door to you, or you see them in town, or maybe on the bus or train on the way to work. Organizations like People to People help the functional, working poor. There are two kinds of poor. There are the obvious or apparent poor...these are people who may be homeless, living in shelters, perhaps they haven't worked in years. They live on public assistance, perhaps. Our donations help these people tremendously.

But there is the functional, working poor that is less apparent. These are people that maybe are underemployed, and although working one, two, or in some cases three jobs they still don't have enough to make ends meet. They make "too much" for public assistance, but not enough to sustain

themselves or their families. Most days they need to make a choice between buying food or paying the utility bill or the rent or mortgage. They look like you and I, they dress like you and I, and many times they live next door or up the street from you and I. Their children go to the same schools as your children, and you see them around town and wouldn't know they are struggling like this.

Our food donations, clothing donations, and time spent in the soup kitchens and food pantries in our towns...and working the garden at BHSS and donating the proceeds help these people tremendously. They may not get public assistance to buy food, and they rely on places to go to get clothing for themselves and their families, food and just a little help to get them through the week.

It is for this reason that we are planning to keep the clothing boxes out, and are working with others to continue to volunteer our time at the soup kitchen, and will look to do more work to feed the hungry and clothe them.

Thank you for your continued support of our Tikkun Olam initiatives. BHSS Brotherhood – changing the world, one Mitzvah at a time!
