

Membership: A Worthwhile Investment

A new year is upon us at Beth Haverim Shir Shalom, and with it a new and exciting chapter. After a two-

year intensive rabbinic search, we are overjoyed to have welcomed Rabbi Ilana Schwartzman as our new spiritual leader, and along with her husband Art Kieres and their daughter Sabine, to our congregational family. Her partnership has already been abundant with blessings, and I am confident that with her leadership, alongside Cantor Perper and in collaboration with our incredible staff and dedicated lay leadership, our community will continue to thrive.

As the lazy days of summer come to a close and the High Holidays approach, I look forward to seeing familiar faces and meeting new ones at BHSS. My hope is that this year you'll hear the call of the shofar as both a personal one as well as communal one - a call for deeper engagement, connection and a commitment to our community. We live in a world where belonging to a brick and mortar synagogue involves a conscious choice and sacrifice. I am well aware that there are other options available which involve less money, less time and less commitment, but I will argue any day of the week (and especially on Shabbat!) that synagogue membership is a worthwhile investment. And should you be fortunate enough to belong to BHSS, as we are, membership is priceless.

Maybe the "payoff" is the *ruach* that is palpable at Shabbat services, or it's being moved by Rabbi Ilana's sermon or Cantor Perper's song; maybe it's the comfort-ing eulogy offered when a loved one dies, or the support of fellow congregants at the shiva home; maybe it's the pride we feel when our children are called to the Torah for the very first time, or it's the powerful engagement of joining with others so that we can be stronger together in pursuing social justice and *tikkun olam*; perhaps it is the satisfaction of supporting our Eternal Lights dinner or contributing to our High Holiday Appeal, of knowing that you are supporting a Jewish

institution and allowing us to support members who otherwise might not be able to be a part of our community; or maybe it's simply having companionship to share and discuss a good book or attend one of the many programs organized by our committees and affiliate groups. The rewards come not in dollars but in the tears in our eyes, the lump in our throats, the pride in our hearts, and the joy of being a part of a sacred community.

There are undoubtedly many "perks" (too many to mention), but I discourage you from viewing your membership as a simple "pay for services" arrangement. Please realize that it is much more than that. It is a promise to the Jewish people for continuity and permanence.

You may be familiar with the Talmudic story of Honi and the carob trees: One day, Honi was walking on the road and saw a man planting a carob tree. Honi asked, "How long will it take for this tree to bear fruit?" The man replied, "Seventy years." Honi then inquired, "Do you really think you will live another seventy years to eat the fruit of this tree?" The man answered, "Perhaps not. However, when I was born into this world, I found many carob trees planted by my parents and grandparents. Just as they planted trees for me, I am planting trees for my children and grandchildren so they will be able to eat the fruit of these trees."

As we begin this new synagogue year, I want to thank you for your past, present and future membership. Let us continue to plant and tend to these trees together as we write the next chapter of Beth Haverim Shir Shalom.

My family joins me in wishing you *Shanah Tovah*! May we all be inscribed for a year of goodness, and may our community be sealed for many years to come.

Rabbi's Reflections

Rabbi Ilana Schwartzman

A man I know is a business owner. There is nothing inherently Jewish about his business, but he is a Jewish man. Over the last few years, during the High Holiday season, he has begun calling employees into his office to offer them sincere apologies and ask them how he can do better. He says that it used to take the workers by surprise, but he felt that if he was going to go through the rituals of Yom Kippur and Rosh Hashanah, it made sense for him to really enact them in his life, professional and personal.

This behavior impresses me. I think that it's easier to go to temple, see our friends, and sit through services than to open ourselves up to criticism in our personal and professional lives. There is a lot of advice about good ways to compartmentalize our work lives from our home lives. Many of us also compartmentalize our religious lives. We leave religion at the synagogue, instead of recognizing that Judaism lives within us—the synagogue is an expression of our religious self, not the embodiment of it.

To that end, at this High Holiday season, we have an opportunity to have our beliefs integrate into each aspect of our lives - our home, our work, and our play. When we approach the *Yamim Noraim*, the Days of Awe, we make a choice about whether we are really willing to change or whether we will say the words, but fundamentally stay the same. I believe that we each have a flaw of choice. This is the flaw that we not only tolerate in ourselves, but think of as definitional. I am the person who... runs late, has one glass too many, makes the inappropriate joke, tells it like it is no matter the consequences, shares more than I listen. Each of us has something.

Sometimes, when we are thinking about *teshuvah* or repentance, we focus on individual actions we did wrong, the specific apology, but not the underlying behavior. Or sometimes we realize that there is a theme that runs through our apologies, but figure that we cannot change who we are. Or perhaps, we are willing to change at home, but not at work or vice versa.



We are all working to integrate our Jewish values into our day-to-day

lives; I will honor the trust invested in me. That is how we let go of our flaws.

Every year I pray, "God, this year, let me apologize for something new, something different." Because every year I hope that I have worked on that thing that has defined who I was the year before. I hope you will join me in trying to tackle the big themes, the issues that permeate our identities, by allowing our Jewish values to become actionable throughout our lives.

We hope everyone learns while in our building; from Lifelong

Learning, to Sifriyah (library) and Music Committee-sponsored events, to holidays, Shabbat, and Youth Group, Sisterhood, Brotherhood, and Michelle Mitzvah/Social Action programming, there are learning opportunities for all ages. During many of these times, we learn not only from the "official" teacher, but we also learn from each other, and that (along with gentle arguing) is a wonderful Jewish tradition. Discussions started in our building carry over into, and enrich, our lives outside of the synagogue.

We try to make the experience in our religious school just as rich. It is the primary place for children from ages 4 through 18 to formally learn at BHSS. There are always conversations going on in classes as students and teachers discuss just about every topic related to their Jewish lives. They even discuss what the prayers they are learning might mean to them, beyond the translation on the page. Our students already learn from our excellent teaching staff, and our teachers already learn from their students.

I'd like to add another layer to this teacher-learner relationship. I want to learn more from you, the parents. I want to hear from you about how your children learn best. I want to know what you hope your children will get out of a Jewish education. I would like to have the opportunity to learn from you and to talk to you about why we do what we do. I would love to have a chance to have real conversations about what is important to YOU and your family. Please call, write, or come in.

The school's mission statement says that we strive to:

... graduate young adults who have the tools they need to form their own Jewish identity. Our aim is to enable families to pass their own traditions "from generation to generation" and help them build strong bonds within their community and with the world, both Jewish and secular. We hope our students will feel comfortable in their Judaism wherever they go in their lives – and above all, to be "mensches," good people.

Jewish education is at the heart of much of who we are at Beth Haverim Shir Shalom – some formal, in our school, and much of it informal in the wide variety of programming we offer. I encourage you to try something new this year, and I look forward to seeing you at the High Holidays and beyond!

Did you know?

Our kindergarten, first, and second grade classes will be FREE of charge to all Beth Haverim Shir Shalom member families for this year. This is a great opportunity to have your younger child become acquainted with our building, clergy, Jewish holidays and customs in a warm, welcoming environment. There is crafting, singing, gaining familiarity with Hebrew, learning about Israel, holidays, "tours" around the building, meeting and "interviewing" our staff, practicing to be a "mensch" and many other experiences – all packed into an hour and a half on Mondays from 4 to 5:30 p.m.

There's no attendance requirement, since we understand that very young children have an off day or another obligation from time to time! In addition, if you want to carpool with a family who has a third grader attending from 4 to 6 p.m. (or even if you just want to have more than an hour and a half to run errands or grab coffee), there is a half hour of enrichment available at a very reasonable fee that allows for dismissal at 6 p.m.

And for your friends who are not yet members: **they can enroll** their children in these three grades as well at a reasonable cost Our early years' programming are some of the most fun years; this is a great opportunity to get started AND have your children learning and doing Jewishly with their friends.

Why wait for your child to begin their Jewish learning experience? Come and see what we're all about!





Education Committee


Happy New Year and welcome back to religious school for the 2018-19 school year! We are so excited to have the students back in the building for another terrific year.



Ritual Committee

The Season of Our Joy written by Arthur Waskow is perhaps one of my favorite "go to" Jewish holiday reference guides. Every time I refer back to the book I learn something new! Holiday reference guides usually include the history and traditional practices of the holiday and may include, as this book does, recipes and new approaches to celebrate. What I really enjoy about the book is learning about how the sun and the moon and the calendar are connected. I loved sharing the Jewish calendar and the rhythm of the moon with my students when I was a Hebrew school teacher back in the day.

The sun cycle festivals, according to Waskow, represent the four seasons; Pesach/spring, Shavuot /summer, Sukkot/fall, Sh'mini Atzeret/winter. The festivals included in the rhythmic moon cycle are Rosh Hashanah/new moon, Yom Kippur/swelling of the moon, Sukkot/full moon, Sh'mini Atzeret/diminishing moon. These are the festivals that are found in the Torah. Over the years the calendar has been enriched with additional festivals that fit into the cycle of the

year to commemorate historical events - such as Purim - and the wonders of nature - like Tu B'shevat. Each holiday brings a different emotion, a seriousness, a silliness, and there is a flow, a connection, a cycle, from one holiday to another.

In the book Waskow says, "we should look at the full circle and not each festival or holiday as separate bubbles and that the cycles help us as individuals to feel more deeply more intensely." Waskow believes "through walking the path of the year, we can renew in ourselves a sense of deep calm, internal harmony, the peaceful sense of shalom" ... interesting concepts. I invite you to explore the cycles of the holidays and walk the path of the year as we begin the New Year. Join us as we celebrate the New Year and these festivals together. From my family to yours,




Transition Committee



Shalom Everyone

A few months ago, I traveled to Puerto Rico to assist with the Hurricane Maria relief efforts. I mentioned I would be reading President Bill Clinton's book, *Giving*, an appropriate book considering the purpose of my trip. I also promised a book report in the next *Temple Topics* - and so here it goes.

No matter what you have, you can always give something. Some people have limited financial resources, so they are able to provide their time and skill. Others have a great amount of financial resources and they partner with existing models to further promote the missions. Think Warren Buffet - instead of setting up his own charity, he contributed to his good friend, Bill Gates's foundation, to augment the work of the Gates Foundation (imagine checking the couch cushions after they leave).

President Clinton echoes the teachings of Pirkei Avot - "It is not incumbent upon you to complete the work, but neither are you at liberty to desist from it." It is in that spirit that I invite you to help do "something." One does not have to do "everything." Anything can be done, and it is all better than "nothing."

The Michelle Mitzvah Group meets the second Tuesday of every month at 7:30 p.m. at the synagogue. I look forward to seeing you then.


