# Using our Time Wisely... and Jewishly

A quick Google search reveals that some controversy exists surrounding whether it is appropriate for Jews to

celebrate January 1st. Some apparently feel slightly guilty doing so, and still others view it as a clear betrayal of our own traditions and customs, labeling it as "secular" and as such, "non-Jewish."

A recent article posted on MyJewishLearning.com by Rabbi Brad Hirschfield, Vice President of the National Jewish Center for Learning & Leadership, may assuage our reluctance to mark the occasion. He points out that deeply embedded in Jewish tradition is the notion that we can, and should, see that there are multiple opportunities to begin again. Each and every day in our morning prayers, traditional Jews recite thanks to God for renewing the world. Each week at Shabbat we recall the first moment of creation, and in doing so give ourselves a chance to start over. At Rosh Hashanah we celebrate the birthday of the world, but the Mishnah, our oral tradition, teaches that there are actually multiple "new years" within the year. Rabbi Hirshfield writes "to commemorate an additional one is not foreign to Jewish practice" and suggests that in lieu of ignoring the occasion and refraining from celebration, our focus might instead shift to how we might mark the beginning of January, Jewishly.

Personally, as a long-time student and now part-time professor, I've always tended to think of my life as divided by semesters, which align more closely with the Jewish New Year (whether Rosh Hashanah falls "early" or "late," it's always contained within the fall semester). That said, I've certainly been known to partake in a New Year's Eve countdown and enjoyed a cocktail or two to commemorate the calendar change...and as you may recall from my High Holiday speech, I am no stranger to confetti.

In fact, I can still vividly recall the first time December 31st rolled around and I didn't make it until midnight. It was 1999, and despite the Y2K hysteria, I drifted soundly asleep, already in my pajamas, quite content without the hoopla, holding then baby Garrett in my arms, a few weeks old, aside a crackling fire. In some ways it seems as if it were only yesterday, yet as I write this article our family is awaiting Garrett's call from college so that we can FaceTime serenade him to celebrate his 19th birthday, the last of his teenage

years. It may sound horribly cliche, but where does the time go?

In graduate school my mentor, Donald Bernstein, may his memory be for blessing, once attempted to explain how quickly time flies as we grow older. He noted that for those of us with kids, it can seem that we are constantly running on a treadmill of constant business (or perhaps more accurately, "busy"-ness). As a fan of Joni Mitchell's music I am frequently reminded of her moving lyrics, perhaps none more powerful than these lines from Circle Game: "And the seasons, they go round and round...and the painted ponies go up and down... We're captive on the carousel of time."

My mentor and Ms. Mitchell are so right. While I don't have many regrets, I sometimes look back on some of the running around that our family did and wonder if I could have made some better, more meaningful choices about how we spent our time. Of course, to some extent we must accept that we are captive to time, but what I am referring to is when the carousel spins too fast, feeling out of control, leaving us dizzy and unable to enjoy the ride. How and when can we learn to slow it down a bit?

When my boys were little there used to be a line item on their report card that read, "Uses time wisely." Needless to say, it was not their best subject! But I was never overly concerned, as I didn't think kindergarten boys were developmentally or cognitively ready to manage their time effectively (not to mention that they weren't alive long enough to have accumulated genuine wisdom). I do think as adults, we could, and should, attempt to make more meaningful decisions regarding our time, given how precious we know it is. I'm always striving to get a better grade.

The first step is to identify what really matters to us. As Stephen Covey writes, "How different our lives are when we really know what is deeply important to us, and keeping that picture in mind, we manage ourselves watch day to be and to do what really matters most." The second step is to then schedule our priorities, instead of prioritizing what's on our schedule.

I recognize it's far easier said than accomplished. I have a print on my desk from Storypeople artist/author Brian Andreas to



This year, the day on which we will commemorate the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. and Tu B'Shvat correspond on the 15th of Shvat, 5779 or January 21, 2019.

Our country established Martin Luther King Day in 1983 and began celebrating it in 1986, though his assassination was in 1968. His death predates me, and I don't remember the controversy that I'm sure surrounded honoring MLK with this special day. I do, however, remember the first time that I was adjured to make this a "day on" instead of a "day off." Martin Luther King, Jr. continues to be a symbol of nonviolent action for what is right. He spoke eloquently and strongly in favor of equality, unity, and dignity. He wanted us to be our best selves and to make our country one of common values encouraging shared respect. His was a religious, personal, communal, and political message.

From our religious tradition, Tu B'shvat seems to have very little to do with respect, equality, or unity among people. Instead, it's about appreciating nature. It is *Chag Hallanot*, the Festival of the Trees and one of the four New Year celebrations on the Jewish calendar.\* It's an odd holiday for us to celebrate during the winter when nothing is in bloom and the trees are bare. And yet, isn't that precisely when we need to be reminded of the beauty and value of nature? When

the ground is covered in snow, the sky is grey, and everything seems dreary; we need to know that in

\* The others are Rosh Hashanah, Passover (which is technically the first day of the first month of the Jewish year), and the first of Elul which is the New Year for birthing cattle. If the many New Years seem odd, think about the modern distinctions of the school year, the fiscal year, the tax year, and the calendar year.

remind me. It reads, "Everything changed the day she figured out there was exactly enough time for the important things in her life".

At BHSS we often hear about how difficult it is to come to services, attend events, and keep appointments. Believe me, I can relate. I am far from judgmental and am fully aware that in today's world, it is not easy to fit everything into our schedule. Not to mention, there are consequences to our choices. When the kids miss a practice they may be temporarily benched; when they miss a rehearsal, they may not get front and center come recital time; when they miss the tutor the "A" may fall out of reach; and when you miss the orthodontist adjustment those wires can get sticky. The list goes on and on. Again, I don't judge but only ask you consider the cost/benefit ratio before surrendering to the norm. I've learned that *sometimes* it's okay if the beds don't get made, or the dinner is take-out or if the cookies don't get properly iced (although the last one, as anyone who knows me

well understands, is to be avoided). Sometimes taking the time to serve our community, include and prioritize Jewish learning, or just to find space to be connected to community or one's own spirituality in prayer, far outweighs the perceived sacrifice.

While January 1st may not be the Jewish New Year, I can't imagine that it is "un-Jewish" to reflect on the goals we set in September. During the High Holidays I encouraged us all to consider making it a priority to become more engaged, or get re-engaged, with our synagogue community. At this time of year I'll simply remind you that if you haven't given us a try yet, there's still time.

I assure you that when you do, it will be worth yours.

Finding Comfort in the Everyday

When one of my sons (not naming names) was in religious school, for a

All I can discern from this behavior is that what happened IN religious school was positive and made him feel good. If you asked him, he didn't look forward to going, but he sure did love being there. And today, he is secure in his identity as a Reform Jew. What more could I ask?

Well, that's how I feel many Sunday mornings. I don't WANT to get up at 7 a.m. and, especially in these dark winter months, I sure don't want to climb into a cold car while everyone else in my household is still cozy. But, once I walk through those doors, I "wake up" the building – turning on lights, plugging in the coffee for Family School, and generally getting ready for the session. My able assistant Laura arrives, and then the teachers and *morei derech*. Our friendly guard Nick comes on duty and we're ready to go. It is a comforting routine, and yet, every school day will be different. (When you get about a hundred different persons/personalities involved, it can't be anything else.) It is A routine, yet it is not routine. There's comfort in it. The same happens on Mondays and Tuesdays, just at a more reasonable hour!

That is how I feel about BHSS as a whole, too. For example, on Wednesday afternoons one can walk down the hall and hear Cantor Perper working with a student in the library while Rabbi Ilana rehearses b'nai mitzvah in the sanctuary.

Iris and Lisa are making sure everything runs smoothly, Roberto is getting the building ready for yet another event, and it's just, again, comforting. This feeling did not take the sixteen years of my time in this position to happen; I felt it within the first year of my family's membership. It is NOT just about us, a close-knit staff who respect and can count on each other. It is about YOU, parents, students, and friends who may be one of those two, or neither.

I am writing on the day after Shabbat Chanukah. The sanctuary was full. About thirty personal family Chanukah menorahs were glowing on tables at the front, which is where I always sit. The glow was not just light and warmth; it is a metaphor for how I feel about this place. My wish for all of you, in 2019, is that you find that comfort at BHSS, too.

dine with new and old friends at your host's home, and meet back up for a grand dessert. This night sells out every year, so be sure to sign up early and often! (Lol)







## What does the new committee greeter program look like and how will it work?

- Be friendly and welcoming to everyone. Even if it's through body language alone, convey that their presence is valued and appreciated.

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


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
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
