On Being a Hero

Rabbi's Reflections

This year, we are celebrating a MARVELous Purim—the theme, of course, having to do with superheroes. I confess, I'm not particularly well-versed in either the DC or Marvel universes. I think I've seen most of the modern iterations of the Batman movies and was in the proximity of someone watching *Captain America*, but that might be the extent of my contemporary superhero viewing. Through a general genre apathy, I managed to miss every single Spiderman, Antman, Deadpool, Wonder Woman, Hulk, Black Panther, Flash, Avenger, Iron Man, or Aquaman movie. At this point, I've missed so much, I'm not sure how I would begin to catch up...even if that were my inclination. But I think I understand what makes a superhero different from a hero.

My theory is that a superhero is someone who has a supernatural power that aids them with a compulsion for standing up to evil.* By contrast, a hero is a mere mortal who takes on evil when confronted by it. There are, then, two main differences: human vs. super-human abilities and whether they intentionally seek to combat injustice. Using that definition, I can say with some certainty that I have yet to meet someone who is super-human (though there are certainly some leaders at BHSS who seem that way a lot of the time).

There are, however, many people in the world who seek out injustice and evil with a view towards taking it on. Usually, these ills are not embodied by a singular villain or even a cabal. Instead, much of what seems immoral or unjust in the world has to do with the distribution of funds, resources, respect, and dignity. Unlike some cinematic fight scene, no amount of speed, muscle, or invisible lasso will correct what ails society. Our heroes, then, are those people who either pursue justice or else confront evil because they could not in good conscience, avoid it.


At this time of year, when we celebrate Purim and Pesach, we have in the Jewish literary universe multiple examples of heroes. Vashti, Mordechai, Esther, Shifra, Puah, Moses, Batya, and Miriam all take major risks when injustice threatens them or their communities. They remind us of the bravery of saying, "no," of advocating to those in positions of power, of overcoming our insecurities for the sake of others, and of taking care of those who cannot take care of themselves.

I'm all set with my Purim costume—and, yes, she's straight out of the Marvel Universe. This, year, I want us to consider what it means to be heroic when we aren't in costume. There are evils in the world that will confront us, even if we don't go looking for them. The Torah teaches us that we don't need to be superheroes, just heroes; we don't need to

be anything other than human. Though, we may be hidden like Esther or tentative like Moses, we can embrace the power each of us has.

This Purim, a mask and a cape help remind us that when it counts, we don't need either of them.

* Batman is an exception. He too has a compulsion to fight evil, but his powers are all purely human, if enhanced through all of the advantages money can buy.



Four Mitzvot of Purim

There are four basic mitzvot established by the Mishnah, the first Rabbinic law code, based on the text of the Book of Esther. Following the salvation of the Jews, Mordecai decreed the everlasting observance of the holiday, and Esther confirmed his ordinance:

Esther 9:29-31

^{9:29} Then Queen Esther daughter of Abihail wrote a second letter of Purim for the purpose of confirming with full authority the aforementioned one of Mordecai the Jew. ³⁰ Dispatches were sent to all the Jews in the hundred and twenty-seven provinces of the realm of Ahashuerus with an ordinance of "equity and honesty." ³¹ These days of Purim shall be observed at their proper time, as Mordecai the Jew—and now Queen Esther—has obligated them to do, and just as they have assumed for themselves and their descendants the obligation of the fasts with their lamentations. [I.e., the Jews are to celebrate this festive holiday in addition to their commemorations of national tragedies.]

1. Reading the Megillah (Mikra Megillah)

And Esther's ordinance validating these observances of Purim was recorded in a scroll (Esther 9:32).

Each year, we retell the story of Purim, found in the Megillah (which is the same as the biblical book of Esther). As this story is one of overturned fortunes and unexpected endings, our recitation of the story is often humorous, honoring the festivity of the holiday.

2. Festive meal (*Se'udat Purim*)



They were to observe [these days of Purim] as days of feasting and merrymaking... (9:22).

Purim is a time for feasting and making a day of gladness. Purim is a time for special foods such as *hamantashen* (cookies filled with poppy seeds or jam) and *kreplach* (dumplings).

3. Sending gifts to friends (Mishloach Manot)



... for sending gifts to one another... (9:22)

On Purim, Jews across the kingdom of Persia celebrated their freedom, and they continue to share in that joy every year. Sending gifts to friends, often baskets of food and treats, is a practice intended to increase everyone's joy, both the sender and the receiver.

4. Sending presents to the poor (Matanot L'evyonim)

...and [sending] presents to the poor (9:22).

The festivities of Purim are not reserved only for those who can afford them. Giving money or other gifts to those who are in need allows the spirit of the holiday to spread to every corner of the community.

Passover begins this year with the first seder on April 22.

A second seder will be here at BHSS on April 23 - in person! Contact the office to join us!

The Four Questions

(or, 1 question and 4 answers!)

שֶׁבְּכָל הַלֵּילוֹת אֵין אָנוּ מַטְבִּילִין אֲפִילוּ פַּעַם אֶחָת. הַלַּיְלָה הַזֶּה שְׁחֵי פְּעָמִים: Sheb 'chol haleilot ein anu mat 'bilin afilu pa-am echat. Halailah hazeh sh'tei f'amim. On all other nights, we don't dip our food even once. On this night we dip twice.

Meet the Member Congregational stories

Each month a congregant writes about how they became involved at Beth Haverim Shir Shalom. We hope you enjoy learning about your fellow or past members' individual stories.

Gloria Leder



My Jewish history began at birth. My parents were the only survivors in their family from Poland. My mother was 16 years old and my father 25 years old at the end of the war. They were refugees in America. I traveled back to Poland with my mother, and saw the home my parents grew up in, and the town they lived in. I also saw the concentration camps and ghettos. But the more important thing to me is knowing that they had a full life before the destruction.

I grew up in Queens, New York in a community that seemed more of a melting pot. I moved to New York City after college, and attended graduate school before raising my family in Ridgewood, New Jersey.

I became interested in my own history, because it seemed like families around me were practicing their religions, and also had extended families. I did not. I had no religious education, and only knew I was Jewish because my parents were "survivors." In New York, it did not seem to be out of the ordinary to be Jewish or any other nationality. In Ridgewood, New Jersey I began to have a different experience.

I struggled to fit into the community and eventually joined a Conservative synagogue with a rabbi who I knew was a child of survivors. He was accepting, understanding and encouraged me to ask questions. My non-Jewish friends encouraged me to learn about my history, and Judaism from its beginnings. I began to study and learn, and to light Shabbat candles. I learned to do a "little bit" of Judaism and increased over time, slowly. I started to kiss the mezuzah when I left and entered my home. I thought about the prayers I read and tried to find when they were written in the history of our people. I read historical novels about our rabbis and families. I listened to the music of our people, classical and contemporary. Now, it is all part of my soul.

I have been involved in Beth Haverim Shir Shalom over many years. I joined as a member, then left, but came to High Holiday Services every year, then finally became a member again... and this time a participant. What changed?

current interests sealed the deal!!

Iris, as well, has always been a smiling and welcoming person, even when I was "just" getting tickets for High Holiday Services. Since then, Michelle and now Rebecca have helped to create a warm, welcoming community where I can be involved and pursue my interest in Judaism.

And now, I am finally completing my Bat Mitzvah this March, along with three other women.

I love my Judaism, but didn't know how to share it with the world. I believe that BHSS is unique because it is accepting of people, it allows you to get involved and change as needed until you find your comfort zone. There are so many ways to find belonging. I began to attend services regularly and joined Sisterhood and the Membership Committee.

Many years ago, I pursued an adult study of Judaism. After four years, my dream was that children would be more involved in the richness of our religion and ongoing learning. Rabbi Ilana has and will continue to create that dream at BHSS.

Also, a miracle happened to me about 8 years ago. One of my father's first cousins found me. He lives in Israel with his family. I have visited them many times since, we speak regularly and try to meet in Israel or Europe. The war has been very difficult for all of us, but mostly for them. We share the yearning for relatives. Their children and grandchildren and mine are unique in that neither of us had cousins or grandparents growing up. The miracle of survival and thriving in life is not lost on us.

The more I learn and become involved, the more I love the richness of our people. Today I am making friends at Beth Haverim Shir Shalom. It is my community. For our B'not Mitzvah, one of my new friends and I are starting a film group on Jewish themes. I hope that it will be accepted and that the community will become interested and involved with us.

I am willing to help out where I can. And I hope to continue my love and enthusiasm for as long as I possibly can.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE

I love to read - books of all kinds, especially historical fiction, crime stories both true and imagined, and I recently discovered there's a whole genre of British detective novels that have become a serious weakness. Although I don't have a 2nd-6th grader (anymore), I attended the talk given by author Lisa Greenwald about her writing and more specifically her latest book, *Ellie's Deli – Wishing on Matzoh Ball Soup*, at BHSS on February 4. I enjoyed it so much I actually purchased a copy for myself!

There were so many things I really liked about being there. Of course, because it was about a book, but more that it was an



Providence Nkurunziza is a Commissioner with the Texas Holocaust Genocide and Anti-Semitism Advisory Commission. She was 11 when five of her siblings, her two parents and the rest of her extended family were wiped out during the genocide against atsis.

Her husband, Eric Nkurunziza was born in Rwanda, but due to the instability within the nation, his parents sent him to the Democratic Republic of the Congo for his safety. Eric lived with his uncle's family, leaving behind his parents, three sisters, and a brother.



"I have to say, when I was your age, on a Saturday night, the last thing I would be doing is what you are about to embark on tonight." Those were the comments from a gentleman in his 80's, admiring the commitment of the members of the BHSS youth group right before we left to go on Midnight Run. Midnight Run involves distributing food, clothing, blankets, and personal care items, face-to-face, to the homeless population on the streets of New York City.

The comments made me think of a scene in the movie *Crocodile Dundee II* when Mick Hogan goes to a club to ask the leader for help. When he asks the leader what they did last night, one member says empathically, "Man, we didn't do nothing. We were here all night." Mick responds, "That's what you call cool, is it? Well, tomorrow, if someone asks you the same question, you can say, 'We didn't do anything.' Or you can say we…IYKYK…we did something last night! We did (fill in the blank)!"

The underlying message that I always took out of the scene is "what is so cool about doing nothing?" Yes, it is fun to relax and everyone is deserving of a little R & R, but that is after you do the work. The work can be whatever you would like. Here is an easy way to help out. Due to the plastic bag ban in NJ, we all probably have too many reusable grocery bags at home. Take one of those bags & fill it up with some of the following items in your home and then drop it off at the synagogue. The food donated will go to the CFA (Center for Food Action). The most needed items are:

- Canned Pastas, Stews, Chilis and Hearty Soups
